These outcomes are also aligned with the new NH DOE work ready standards for employability that will be integrated in the competencies for all programs. We are struggling with a good way to provide base line data quantifying work ethic beyond the anecdotal data we currently have. Some options include absence and tardy rates, as well as work completion rates however we do not wish to choose are initiative based solely on the ease of measurement.
